

To Whom it May Concern:

It is my understanding that Ian Maguire has been nominated for the Ann DeBock Alumni Leadership Award. I have been requested, as an employee of Mr. Maguire's law firm, to provide any insight into the type of leader Mr. Maguire has been in our community.

By way of introduction, I have had the great privilege of working under Mr. Maguire's supervision for over a decade now. I began my employ in 2003, while still attending classes for my paralegal degree. In my first year at the firm, Mr. Maguire spent hours every day working as my mentor. The efforts and guidance of Mr. Maguire have helped me to grow into a skilled professional and a paralegal that is respected among both the Plaintiff and Defense bars. While this may not seem exceptional, his dedication to my growth was in addition to multiple commitments both to his clients and our community. There were times that I honestly wondered if he ever slept! In retrospect, I cannot recall a single person/organization that he declined to assist. I watched as he would attend meetings for the Rape Crisis Center and volunteer as a coach for the Socastee High School Mock Trial team. He was constantly on the go, at times even double-booked, but handled it all with a smile and gracious humility. It was (and still is) inspiring to see him recognize the struggles of those in our community. This deep-felt compassion left him always looking for ways to volunteer his time or provide monetary support to any organization assisting those in need. He truly has an earnest desire to make a difference in the lives of others.

Although Mr. Maguire has mastered the art of leading through example and trusting those under his guidance, his most impressive trait would be his humble nature. In my early years with the firm I often assisted with making sure donations arrived in the proper hands. Upon completion of my task, I would ask him if we could mention his generosity in firm newsletters, press releases, etc. These were all means that I had witnessed other professionals utilizing to make the community aware of their generosity. Kitchen? His reply was quick, he saw a need. Mr. Maguire had recently moved to a new area of the Grand Strand. He told me that as he drove his new route to work he kept seeing people in a wooded area at odd times of the day. His curiosity was peaked and he started asking around about the situation. What he discovered is that the area that he was traveling past was a common place for transient members of our community; those displaced either temporarily or permanently. Mr. Maguire went on to explain that he could not get those people out of his mind. After making several inquiries as to what he could possibly do to help, he found the Community Kitchen. That is why, simple as that.

As I said earlier, I have had the privilege to work for Mr. Maguire for over a decade now. I truly mean privilege. Through his leadership I have grown not only professionally, but personally as well. It is hard to condense down all that I have witnessed over the years, but hopefully I have provided you with a bit of insight into his greatness. They thank the local hero police officer or EMS workers. It's great that politicians extend our gratitude post crisis. What upsets me though is the lack of appreciation before an incident occurs.

Every day that an officer dons a bullet proof vest and the tires of his patrol car roll is in itself an act of heroism. I have learned that not all cops should have badges. But offi-

cers who genuinely wish to serve the public are heroes 40 hours a week as they risk their lives for people they have never even met. What stuns me like a Taser is that Atlantic Beach Police officers do not have health insurance.

Local government provides the bullet proof vest, but not the health insurance to cover the doctor bill if they actually get shot. I would like to think all officers would have access to health care such as vision exams. If officers are provided bullets and guns to perform job duties then shouldn't we provide health insurance so we are sure their contacts lenses fit well enough that they shoot the person they are aiming for?

As a registered nurse another thought comes to mind. If an officer has asthma he would need to have regular primary health care to keep the asthma under control with allergy shots, rescue inhalers or possible inhaled corticosteroids. Will the next headline read "suspect in armed robbery outruns police officer having asthma attack"? "Sources reveal officer had no health insurance, inhaler empty."

I don't understand why a municipality would provide vests, bullets, guns and Tasers but skip health insurance for full time police officers, but hey it's Atlantic Beach.
